The Council meeting of the Borough of Wind Gap on Monday, May 6, 2002 was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Council President Winton Male, Jr., at which time he reminded those present that the meeting was being recorded. In attendance were Councilmen: Lewis Paulhamus, Jack Hannon, Mitchell D. Mogilski, William Pysher, and Richard Getz. Also in attendance were Alyssa Lopiano-Reilly from Solicitor Zito's Office, Borough Engineer Ronald Madison and Borough Secretary Louise Firestone. Mayor Kenneth George and Councilman Kerry Gassler were absent.

**Approval of Minutes -**

**On motion** by Bill Pysher to approve the minutes of April 16, 2002 and the Special Meeting of April 25, 2002 and seconded by Mitchell D. Mogilski, Sr. Roll call vote taken. In favor: R. Getz, W. Male, M. Mogilski, L. Paulhamus, B. Pysher. Abstain: J. Hannon. Motion carried with a vote of 5-0-1.

**Approval of Expenditures -**

**On motion** by Lewis Paulhamus to approve the expenses for the month of April in the amount of \$37,023.35 and seconded by Bill Pysher. Jack Hannon questioned the expense to Miracle Recreation Equipment Company to be charged to Capital Equipment in the Park budget in the amount of \$5,264.00. Jack asked if there is a maximum amount that the Park Board must come before Council for approval prior to purchase? Mr. Male replied that \$4,000 has to do with the Borough Code and if it is over \$4,000, three bids must be received. Lewis explained that the Park Board try to get three bids for this playground equipment, but only one supplier could be found. The equipment is to be delivered on June 3. Mr. Male suggested that Council approve this expense, but require that the Park Board specify which line item it will be taken out of as this amount exceeds their budgeted \$5,000 for Capital Equipment.

Mayor George arrived at approximately 7:45 p.m. At this time, Chief Craig Armitage introduced three members of the Lion's Club, Chuck Blaiza, Barry Young and Kay Young. The Plainfield Lion's Club made a generous donation of an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) to the Wind Gap Police Department. The Chief explained that the unit is used for cardiac arrest, heart attacks, it is a life saving unit. The Wind Gap Police Officers have been trained and the unit is carried in the Police car with the Officer on duty. The Mayor extended his thanks on behalf of the Borough, Council, himself and the Police Department. Mr. Blaiza stated that these types of donations are made possible by the community, the funds raised in the community are given back to the community.

Including the purchase of swings for the Park, the line item is over budget by \$839.00. Rick Keenhold stated that the difference for the playground equipment is to be taken out of the Legion donation made several years ago. The Borough Treasurer explained that according to April 2001 Park Board minutes that remaining balance was spent on playground equipment purchased in 2001. This was corresponded to the Park Board President along with a spreadsheet of expenses for the entire the Legion donation of \$12,000. Mitch stated that in the past the remaining balance of the Legion money was to be used for a horseshoe pit in the Park. Rick

disputed this statement by saying Mr. Gassler, himself and Lou Paulhamus went directly to the Legion. The Legion said that no one from the Legion made a statement that the money had to be used for horseshoe pits, nor were they going to make the Board put them in. They said spend the money for rides in the Park. Mitch suggested holding payment and delivery until Council finds out which line item this expense will be charged. Vic Zucal asked Council not to delay the delivery and if necessary use the money that was budgeted for the brush hog. Vic stated that during his years on the Park Board any item over \$10,000, they would come before Council to request it be put out for bid and any other item over \$4,000, the Park Board would make three phone calls on their own. Council decided to approve payment, but not make payment until delivery of equipment. Roll call vote taken. Motion carried unanimously.

### **Public Comment -**

1. Michael McNamara, 328 Alpha Avenue, Wind Gap. Mike asked Council about Pine Alley. He said that the person blocking the alley stated he has the permission from Borough Council to block the alley. Mr. Male stated that this issue is on the agenda for discussion during tonight's Executive Session.
2. Roger Bet, Park Board. Roger asked if there has been any word about the grant for the Park restroom? Mr. Male replied that he spoke to Representative Craig Dally's office and they have no word at this time, but they will let us know as soon as they know something. Mayor George added that he spoke to Senator Dent at the Wind Gap Ambulance gathering and Senator Dent expressed that things look promising for some funding. Mr. Male added that he is in the process of asking DCED for an extension because of delay in announcement of this grant.
3. John Snuggs submitted pictures of the night lamp at the Park. This light is north of the lower field and it is hanging by a wire. He stated that he is also concerned about the backstop being too close to the umpire. He asked that consideration be given to moving the fence back. John Zucal to check out the light tomorrow.
4. Robert Matlock recited an excerpt from the minutes from July 2, 2001 regarding Pine Alley. "Mr. McNamara, 328 Alpha Avenue requested the police regulate Pine Alley as in the past until a petition is filed. Mr. Molnar on behalf of Mr. Matlock stated alley was not used, never maintained by Borough, it is unused, all grass and doesn't believe one property owner can undo what has been going on for decades. Mr. Zito stated four options: take no official action and continue to regulate under police powers, can vacate all or portion, reinform Mr. Matlock of his right to petition to Council, or advise both Mr. McNamara and Mr. Matlock that their respective positions are proper subject for civil action to determine their right to Pine Alley. Motion by Councilman Mogilski and seconded by Mr. Male. Motion passed". He also read from a memo to Mitch Mogilski from Mr. Zito. 1. Simply laying out a street does not create public use, 2. When a street or alley is laid out, but not formally opened for a period of more than ten years, the adjoining landowners may petition the municipality to vacate the street, 3. When a street or alley has been laid out, but not opened or used for a period of 21 years or longer, it may not be opened by the municipality without the consent of 51% of the landowners, unless the Borough exercises its power of eminent domain. Mr. Matlock stated that between himself and two others, they own the majority of land along the alley. He owns two lots, Mr. Gower owns three lots, Mr. and Mrs. Eddie Campbell own five lots. It has never been used as a thoroughfare and he believes that it should remain this way. Mr. Matlock feels that this issue has already been resolved.
5. George Hinton. George suggested that Council start reviewing the streets to be done next year so that the bids can be put out in January or February. He asked if Council had considered his suggestion about

purchasing a fireproof safe for the Police Department? He stated that he is the Treasurer for the Fire Company and wanted to get the procedure for having bills submitted to the Borough for payment. Mr. Male instructed him to drop off the bill at the Borough Office.

6. Rick Keenhold. Rick asked if anything further had developed regarding the \$10,000 from the Roosevelt Street zoning issues. Mr. Male replied that a decision was made on that in 1997 from the Borough Solicitor and the amount was not \$10,000, but \$5,000 and change. Rick asked for a copy of the legal opinion. He said he understood that Grand Central Sanitation had made a donation to the Park? Borough Treasurer replied that the donation received by the Borough was specifically for the Recreation Board's Easter Egg Hunt, not the Park. Rick stated he received a letter from Plainfield Township saying that the money has to be spent by the end of this year. Mr. Male answered that Plainfield asked for a disposition of it and they wanted to be kept abreast of what is going on. Mr. Male will follow up with a monthly report. Mr. Male replied that no deadline was stated in the correspondence. Rick said that if we do not get the grant, then they will look at doing the old bathrooms. He added that Council wants to waste more tax dollars by having the Borough Engineer do the plans because Council doesn't trust the Sewer Authority's line development into there. Rick said that if the Borough Engineer is involved it will take approximately four or five months. He suggested voting on this as soon as possible. Mr. Male stated that once Council knows how much money is available for the project it can go forward.

Rick questioned why the low bidder was not chosen for the Bog Turtle Study at the Park. Ron explained that Hanover recommended the second lowest bidder and there was \$200 difference in base price. The low bidder had a long list of extras in their bid, including getting a written copy of their report. Based on the list of extras by the low bidder the total project cost would be cheaper with the second low bidder. Rick asked why the Borough backhoe was on Center Street on Mr. Male's property. Mr. Male replied that John was cleaning out the storm grate as he does all around town because they become clogged with leaves and debris. Rick accused Mr. Male of directing John up on his property to do the work. Mr. Male replied that he actually complained that all the work that the contractor did building up the bank with stone, topsoil and grass was ripped up by the backhoe in the process of cleaning up the leaves. John went back and fixed it as best as possible. Rick asked why John was in the creek with the backhoe, to which Mr. Male replied that we should have never been in the stream with a backhoe. Ron Madison added that there are child safety grates on all the culverts because they are long culverts. The grates fill up with leaves, brush and branches and as routine maintenance they must be removed. No permit is required to clean the child safety grates because the stream bed is not being disturbed. Rick next issue was the Park Board. Rick guaranteed that he will be filing a summons and he will not give up his seat. He believes that he is entitled to an attorney from the Borough. He has checked with five attorneys and only one has an opinion different from the other four and that is the one that the Borough is paying for so certainly go with what you need to go with. Talk about discrimination, he has talked to two or three people that have said Mr. Male and Mr. Getz do not want to have me there and you hate me and all this. Mr. Male stated that he is not going to argue this point, but that is not what he said. Rick said that if you look back through all the minutes he is being discriminated against.

Rick accused Richard Getz of going around and trying to find everyone he could to be on the Park Board. He asked Richard if he ever asked Mr. Snuggs and how many times. Richard answered that he recalls asking him once. John Snuggs said he asked him twice. Richard said okay twice. Richard said when he originally spoke to John, John offered that he had been asked by nine people to join the Park Board and he was going to definitely going to put an application in and a few weeks later when Richard ran into him in town, he asked him why he didn't apply.

Rick stated that at the last meeting Mr. Getz put in a motion to get with Pen Argyl to join with them about a health study for Grand Central Sanitation. Richard replied that it was to support them. The Mayor added that a

letter will be sent to Plainfield Township and DEP in support of the health study. Rick stated that Richard has a family member in direct contact fighting Grand Central for that reason. He asked Richard if he is now using tax dollars to help benefit his daughter-in-law. Richard acknowledged that his daughter-in-law is protesting, but she is not fighting, there's no legalities there. He is not aware of them taking any legal actions, but like many other people they are protesting. Rick said he was under the impression that there was talk about Grand Central buying their house. Richard clarified that yes they were approached about selling their house, but they were not happy with the covenant that they would have had to sign and therefore, they turned it down and as far as he knows it is a dead issue. He has no interest there at all.

Leonard Zito arrived at 8:19 p.m. and Alyssa Lopiano-Reilly departed at 8:19 p.m.

Jack Hannon asked Mr. Zito about the letter dated April 22, 2002 and what is Mr. Keenhold bringing forth. Mr. Zito replied he received a copy of the Writ of Summons, which is a notice of a filing of a lawsuit by Richard Keenhold, Rick's Construction, Inc. He was instructed by the Borough President to take certain internal action, administrative in nature. Mr. Zito entered his appearance in the court for the Borough of Wind Gap. He filed documentation to ask Mr. Keenhold to file a complaint, setting forth the precise nature of his claim. Circuit Courts issued an order or a rule on Mr. Keenhold on April 23, 2002 to file a formal complaint within twenty (20) days of that date.

## Committee Reports

1. **EMS - Mayor George reported** that the Ambulance Corp had a good ceremony. He thanked all who attended and those who made a donation for the purchase of the new ambulance. Senator Dent, Representatives Dally and Grucela were in attendance. On behalf of the State, they presented the Wind Gap Ambulance Corps with a check for \$20,000 toward the new ambulance. The Mayor thanked the ambulance personnel for their hard work and dedication for their service.

2. **Police - Bill Pysher reported** the new police car has been ordered and expect delivery in May. Still pending is the litigation on the police contract. Bill made the recommendation to have Mr. Zito present the Borough's position to the arbitrators on July 29. Mr. Male stated that this will be discussed in Executive Session. Chief Armitage stated that the power went off in the building today and the emergency generator kicked on, but did not supply electricity to the Police Station. The Mayor believes that the generator only supplies electricity to the 911 Center upstairs, but Council may want to add to the circuit. Bill suggested sending a letter to Plainfield Lion's Club on behalf of Borough Council to thank them for the donation of the defibrillator.

Tom Knitter, EMS, wanted to publicly thank Mr. Hinton for the installation of the flagpole and the Borough for all their help. He added that they even have grass in front of the building.

3. **Streets - Mitchell D. Mogilski, Sr. reported** striping was completed today on Upper and Lower Alpha, Longcore and East West Street. This Friday at 9:00 a.m. a representative from Structural Metal Fabricators will be here to show a truck. Street sweeping will be May 28, 29, 30, 31. Tom Knitter thanked Mitch for putting a yellow line down Alpha Road. Mitch added that companies who stripe and do street sweeping are now in the computer for easier reference in the future.

4. **Finance and Administration - Winton Male reported** another 439.5 tons of tires removed or a total of 159,900 tires. To date 710 documents have been archived.

5. **Sanitation and Recycling - The Mayor reported** that he has completed the Recycling Performance Grant.
6. **Zoning / Planning - Richard Getz reported** that Zoning Hearing Board did not meet on April 3. At the Zoning meeting on May 1 the Zoning Hearing Board reorganized. Mark Sharp was named Chairman and Andrew Biondo is Vice Chairman. The Board heard two applications for variances of decks. They were asking for additional footage and both variances were granted. The Planning Commission met on April 4 to reorganize. William Sisolak is the Chairman and Sarah Branham is the Vice Chair. A Planning meeting was not held in May because no submissions were made.
7. **Parks – Lewis Paulhamus** questioned why after the Council workshop meeting, Mr. Male called Council members to ask permission to pay the AA's insurance. Lewis added that the reason he voted against it was if the Borough starts paying insurance they will have to pay for all non-profit groups. Mr. Male explained that Council had previously discussed paying the Athletic Association's insurance premium instead of giving them the \$1,500 yearly donation. He added that the insurance is needed not because of the property involved, but because of the liability exposure that the Borough has due to the nature of the sports activities. Rick Keenhold stated that the AA came to a Park Board meeting and stated that the insurance was paid up. Mr. Male said that a payment was received, but when the next payment was due they did not pay. The Borough received another cancellation notice and when he inquired, they have been without proper coverage since February 23. He notified the Athletic Association of the payment to avoid any double payment being made.
- Roger Bet asked about the \$5,000 budgeted to put in the sidewalks at the Park. He said that Chris Bruch reported back to the Park Board after the workshop meeting that Council felt the engineer should be involved. Mr. Male explained that a problem arose because Council was not aware and because this is a capital expenditure and a permanent fixture in the Park, Council must be aware of the project. Vic Zucal asked Council if the Borough Engineer can look into plans and draw up a set of specs. Mitch suggested instead of spending the money on an engineer, a contractor could do it. Rick stated that it was the intention of the Park Board to have John dig it, forms would be donated and John would form it when he has time as was done on the other side for sidewalks. Rick said it will cost the Borough \$10 - \$12,000 to have a contractor do the work as opposed to maybe \$3,500 to have John do the work. Ron Madison stated that if an ordinance addresses sidewalks, then the Borough should abide by the ordinance. If the Borough is satisfied with the curblin and the same grades will be followed and pitch it to the street and the drainage is okay, then no involvement may be necessary by the engineer. There may be some concern about the legal right-of-way or additional easements because Third Street is a State road. Mr. Zito added the Borough may waive portions of ordinances relative to these construction items. His own recommendation is if the Borough chooses to do so, it should only be done after receiving that recommendation from the Borough Engineer and the Planning Commission. The engineer should determine if there are any safety or other issues that may affect the welfare or the rights of the public.
- Suggestion to have the Athletic Association provide the Borough with a copy of their finances.
8. **Building / Grounds - Winton Male reported** Street Committee receiving bids to enlarge the salt shed to house the additional salt. To be discussed at Workshop meeting.
9. **Fire Company – Mitchell D. Mogilski, Sr. reported** that the Fire Company had their elections - Fire Chief - Randy George, First Assistant - Jeff Thomas, Second Assistant - Toby Lawson.
10. **Wind Gap Municipal Authority – Thomas Knitter reported** that the Municipal Authority would like a status update on Walden III regarding occupancy permit. Mr. Zito replied that the Zoning Officer, John Blick

has been corresponding with him. Jack read from a letter, "...according to Mr. Cassidy's letter to Council of April 1, 2002, the Sewer Authority has not acted on the application submitted September 5, 2001 for the cottage conversion". He asked Sewer Authority if they are aware of this? Tom replied that the Sewer Authority makes the agreement, not the applicant.

11. **Insurance - Winton Male reported** the Borough insurance premiums will be increasing.

12. **Land Use Committee – Winton Male reported** no meetings have taken place.

A. **Mayor's Report - Ken George reported** received \$150.00 for Contractor Licenses in April for a total of \$1,300. May 15th is the Slate Belt Municipal Association meeting at the Plainfield Township Municipal Building. They will be discussing forming a COG. He would like to invite all of Council to attend the meeting, it will start at 7:30 p.m. He contacted Mr. Westover from Guistine Association regarding complaints received about the garbage blowing from the shopping center across Male Road into the swamp area. Mr. Westover will contact and meet with the Mayor when he comes to Wind Gap. Police Report for April received by Council includes responding to 12 motor vehicle accidents, issued 45 traffic citations, 7 adults charged with felony counts of theft and robbery, 3 adults charged with DUI. The Mayor explained that typically two officers are on duty Friday nights, but because of vacation schedules only one officer will be on duty.

B. **Solicitor's Report - Len Zito reported** all of the legal matters have been reported to Council and Mayor via correspondence.

C. **Engineer's Report - Ron Madison reported** as of May 3, no Bog Turtles have been seen in the wetlands. Three more trips are required. Preliminary report is that it looks good that there will not be any bog turtles. The next step would be to get the wetlands encroachment permit from DEP. Ron referenced his memo asked Council their intention of spending the remaining \$22,000 grant money from the Community Development Block Grant for stormwater projects 5 & 6. The County is requesting that this remaining money be spent prior to the end of the year. Ron suggests additional inlets at the intersection of Mechanic and Water Streets or stabilization of streams between the streets which would require easements. Ron suggested talking to homeowners about the streams and get some of their feelings. Ron wrote a letter regarding Walden III and there is no reason for the Borough to give relief for any of the requirements. Cortazzo Subdivision is still a sketch plan for the Planning Commission. Ron made the recommendation to have their subdivision connect to East First Street as it exists from Broadway to the first alleyway and if possible to connect to Lehigh Avenue.

## **New Business**

1. RCN Telecom Service Intention to Renew Franchise. Mr. Male asked Jack Hannon to research this issue for discussion at a future meeting. Mr. Male suggested contacting the Borough Association and some other municipalities.

## **Old Business**

1. Resolution 2002-1 Workshop Meeting format. **On motion** by Mitchell D. Mogilski, Sr. to adopt Resolution 2002-1 and seconded by Richard Getz. Lewis asked that if Council is not able to make motions at the workshop will more general meetings have to be scheduled? Mr. Male answered that the resolution states if there is an emergency of a general nature a vote can be taken at the workshop meeting. A special meeting can

be called if it is warranted. The Borough Solicitor and the Borough Engineer will not be in attendance at the Workshop meetings. Roll call vote taken. In favor: R. Getz, W. Male, M. Mogilski, B. Pysher, J. Hannon. Opposed: L. Paulhamus. Motion carried with a vote of 5-1.

2. Committee Spending Limits. Lewis reported that the committee has not met. Mitch asked Council for more input on their ideas concerning the limits to be set.

3. Street Bid Advertising. Mitch reported that the deadline for installation or repair of curbs is June 1. Council needs to discuss what action they will take if the work is not completed on the curbs. This topic to be on the May workshop agenda. **On motion** by Mitchell D. Mogilski, Sr. to put the street bids out for advertisement and include begin work July 1 and ending August 14. Motion died for lack of a second.

Ron Madison suggested changing the completion date from August 14 to the PennDOT specification of October 31, 2002. He also suggested opening the bids a few days prior to the meeting so Council can have the figures in front of them before the meeting. As long as the advertisement includes the date and time of bid opening and two people representing Council are present the bids can be opened. Once the bids have been opened, it can be stated that it will not be official until presented at a Borough Council meeting. To get the best pricing, give the contractors the full paving season to complete the work. Mr. Male suggested putting the streets out to bid as soon as possible to give the contractors plenty of time. The advertising must be done twice, the last no less than 10 calendar days prior to opening and not in the same calendar week. Ron said that the Secretary can review the ads from last year and modify for this year.

**On motion** by Lewis Paulhamus to advertise to meet the public bidding laws so that they can be opened prior and presented to Council at the June 3 meeting and the bid documents will allow the contract to be completed in October and seconded by Jack Hannon. Roll call vote taken. Motion carried unanimously.

4. Waiving of Curb Permit Fee. **On motion** by Mitchell D. Mogilski, Sr. to complete the permit fee application, but waive permit fees for minor curb repairs and any replacement curbing, but for new construction the fees will not be waived and seconded by Bill Pysher. Roll call vote taken. Motion carried unanimously.

5. Third Street Traffic Study Fee Approval. **On motion** by Richard Getz to have Hanover Engineering complete the necessary study for PennDOT at a cost of \$1,200 and seconded by Bill Pysher. Roll call vote taken. Motion carried unanimously.

6. Park Board Appointment. **On motion** by Lewis Paulhamus to leave Rick Keenhold as a member of the Park Board. Motion died for lack of a second. **On motion** by Bill Pysher to appoint Kathleen McFall to the Park Board and seconded by Richard Getz. Lewis asked why and who on Council went to get a person to put in an application for a vacant seat and not recognize Rick as a member? Mr. Male stated that he doesn't recall, but this vacancy has been discussed numerous times and it was advertised in the newsletter. Mr. Zito stated that appointments to a board such as the Park Board does not require advertisement unless committed by a Borough Ordinance. Roll call vote taken. In favor: R. Getz, W. Male, M. Mogilski, B. Pysher, J. Hannon. Opposed: L. Paulhamus. Motion carried with a vote of 5-1.

7. Part-time Police Officer - COPS Grant. Chief Armitage explained that the Department of Justice is offering a Universal Hiring Program grant for a period of three years and this is an opportunity to receive money to hire another part-time officer. **On motion** by Bill Pysher to apply for the COPS Grant and seconded

by Lewis Paulhamus. Roll call vote taken. Motion carried unanimously.

8. PSAB CDL Drug & Alcohol Testing Program Membership. **On motion** by Richard Getz to participate and renew our membership and seconded by Lewis Paulhamus. Roll call vote taken. Motion carried unanimously.

9. North American Equity Receivable Collection. Mr. Male suggests to Council to have the Borough Solicitor collect the outstanding receivable of \$15,162.50 from North American Equity. Jack Hannon asked what this amount is for? Mr. Male explained that these are development costs (legal and engineering) that the Borough was suppose to be reimbursed for as a result of the North American Equity / Oakwood Apartments. He added that North American Equity has received invoices with itemized bills attached. Mr. Zito asked if there is a question about whether the bill is owed to which Mrs. Perin acknowledged that she owes it. Linda Perin accused Mr. Male of holding up her project for nine years. Mr. Male stated that this has nothing to do with him, that a debt is owed to the Borough and must be collected. Mr. Zito asked Linda if she is being represented by Stan Margle. She stated that she was, but now she has Mr. Joseph Zator and he is reviewing everything at this time. Mitch suggested that since Mrs. Perin has switched attorneys, Council should grant her attorney time to review the file and put this on the agenda for the next business meeting. She stated that she will notify her attorney that Borough will be seeking reimbursement. Linda Perin stated that she is willing to pay if the project goes forward. Mr. Zito that since Mrs. Perin acknowledges that she owes the money, his discussions with her attorney will be geared toward what her position is with respect to paying this amount. He would like to have what the Borough has on file with regard to the bills.

**On motion** by Mitchell D. Mogilski, Sr. to provide information to the attorneys and at the next business meeting decide what to do and seconded by Richard Getz. Roll call vote taken. Motion carried unanimously.

10. Zoning Fee Schedule. Lewis stated that Mitch, Kerry and himself have not completed this yet. Mr. Male explained that according to Borough financial records in 2001 Zoning expense was \$17,123 and Income was \$10,059 or a net loss of \$7,064 and in 2000 Zoning Expense was \$24,811 and Income was \$12,052 or a net loss of \$12,759. Even with a new fee schedule the fees would not make up for these kinds of losses. The fee schedule has been revised by the Land Use Committee with input from three attorneys, the Borough Engineer and the Zoning Officer. Mr. Male stated that people are underestimating their cost to keep their fees down and there is no way to control it with the current fee structure. Jack Hannon requested tabling this topic because he does not have any information. **On motion** by Jack Hannon to table this until he has further time to study and seconded by Richard Getz. Roll call vote taken. Motion carried unanimously.
